## 2. PUBLIC COMMENT

### 3. PRESENTATIONS

A. Maser Consulting to discuss Jaynes Avenue Water and Sanitary Sewer Improvement Project.

A representative from Maser Consulting was not available for the presentation. Therefore the scheduled presentation was not made.

Mayor Silver said he was pretty sure the project will start the week of March 6<sup>th</sup>. Councilmember Wudzki reached out to the schools to advise them that there may be a disruption in the flow of the traffic which may affect the school buses. The Police Department will assist with traffic control.

The contractor will do about 300 feet a day. They will start at the south end of town and work their way up the hill, heading north. The contractor will clean up the worksite each day. No material will be left on the roadway. The staging area will be the parking lot in front of the soccer field.

B. Larry Morgan of Tilson Tech to discuss Verizon Wireless Right-of-Way request.

Mr. Morgan advised via email to the Acting Borough Clerk that he would be late due to another meeting. Mayor Silver explained that Larry Morgan is from Tilson Technologies and was to discuss right-of-way request which was discussed at a previous meeting. More and more data is required by Verizon Wireless' users. This does not have to do with voice service as much as data service. They are attempting to put in low height antenna repeaters instead of using high cell towers. They will utilize Jersey Central Poles somewhere in town. These poles have not been identified yet. The repeaters are the size of transformer however; it is installed at the top of the utility pole.

Mr. Morgan's presentation was given after the Council Reports.

## 4. ORDINANCE

### Ordinance 2017-01 Amending and Supplementing Chapter 17 of the Borough Code Entitled "Solid Waste Management"

First Reading

Mayor Silver explained the Borough's solid waste contract is up for renewal and the Borough must go out to bid. The Ordinance amends the collection of garbage, refuse, yard waste and recycling for residences and institutional establishments. It also amends that all commercial establishments will be responsible for their own garbage, refuse, recycling and yard waste collection.

Councilmember Asay suggested deleting a portion of section 17-2.12 (b) which indicated "The arrangement for collection of designated recyclables hereunder shall be the responsibility of the commercial establishment property owner or their designee, unless the Municipality provides for the collection of the recyclables." He believed that the section made it unclear if the Borough would pick up recycling for commercial establishments. Inasmuch as the Borough will not be picking up recyclables for commercial establishments, he suggested the wording "unless the Municipality provides for the collection of the recyclables" be removed.

**9. COUNCIL REPORTS**

Councilmember Asay thanked the Police Department for covering for the School Crossing Guards who have been out due to illness.

Councilmember Asay reported that the Police have been working on reports of speeding school buses throughout the borough. None have been caught but he assures the school buses are being monitored closely and are not speeding through town. They may seem like they are speeding because of their size and loudness, but they are not.

Councilmember Asay also reported that an Office of Emergency Management (OEM) meeting was held on February 15<sup>th</sup>. There will be a nuclear exercise conducted on September 26<sup>th</sup>.

He also met with the Emergency Management Director and the Captain of the First Aid Squad. They are trying to work on the First Aid’s response issue. The squad is down to 9 active members. They have difficulty getting a crew together during the day and sometimes at all times during the week. They have 2 new EMT’s that are in training and only have 2 active members who live in the borough. They are desperately in need of new members. They are willing to take junior members who are still in High School. They will pair the junior member up with an active EMT and start them on in-service training. They are willing to accommodate schedules and try to get new members. The initial training is 200 hours spread over a number of weeks. Each of the active members must have 48 hours of in-service training every year. They are also willing to train drivers who will only drive the ambulance. Drivers would only need first aid and CPR training. Driver training can be done in a day to be certified to drive the ambulance.

Councilmember Asay was privileged to be invited and attended the Fire Company Officer Installation Dinner the last weekend in February. The Fire Company announced their 1928 Ahrens-Fox Pumper, which is still operational, was voted “Best Looking Fire Truck in Ocean County.” 50 fire trucks were submitted and 8,000 votes were cast online.

The Fire Company honored two members for 60 years of service: Al Gabriel and Tim Cagney. Councilmember Asay wanted to make sure the Council recognized their 60 years of service and congratulated them.

Councilmember Bendel has no report.

Council President Berglund reported that the Island Heights Cultural and Heritage Association will be sponsoring their Annual Wine Tasting Fundraiser Dinner to benefit the Cottage Museum, on Thursday, April 20, 2017 from 7 to 9 at Caffe’ Italia, Toms River, NJ. The cost is \$55 per person. If you are interested in participating, contact Kenneta Tomaso at 732-929-2815.

Council President Berglund reported that Maser Engineering has not given a recent status update on the sewer station damages that took place during Superstorm Sandy and the review that has taken place on potential fines for the Borough should we not show progress towards the resolution. In an effort to address the issues, the Department of Public Works has tried to standardize the sewer lift pumps in the lift stations. The pump itself is going to be uniform. They put a restriction in the outlet of the pipe so the head is adjusted through the orifice, but the pumping mechanism will be interchangeable from lift station to lift station. Now, we can also have a much smaller generator that will be of a more reasonable price and comply with the DEP requirements.

Tree trimming is going on in the borough. One person refused to let the utility tree trimmers on the property. Council President Berglund said that the utility has the right to clear the lines and he is not sure if the utility company will take any action against the property owner.

Councilmember Wudzki reported that she spoke to Tim from Vollers regarding the water and sewer utility work on Jaynes Avenue. All the residents received letters from Vollers about the construction. The plan is to do piece by piece work and there will not be too much interruption by way of detours, etc.

Councilmember Wudzki reached out to the school district who informed her they are aware of the construction. Luckily there are no bus stops on Jaynes Avenue.

The School is having their STEAM Fair, which is a new program this year, instead of their traditional science fair. They have outside resources coming in such as Cattus Island and the Barnegat Bay Partnership. The event will be open to the public. They will have experiments in the classrooms with hands-on, interactive, experiences. It will be a great event at the school on Thursday, April 6<sup>th</sup>, from 5 to 7 p.m.

Councilmember Snow reported that the loud sound coming off the water that sounds like a motor boat is, in fact, a construction crew dismantling the last of the ship-to-shore radio system on Good Luck Point. An unidentified member of the audience reported that he asked what the noise was and was told that it is the machine that must dig out the entire pole from the foundation. The poles cannot be cut, they must be removed in their entirety.

Councilmember Snow reported that they have received back all of the IT surveys. All employees have been covered and they now have a better idea how employees in the town use the website and computer software. We are now ready to move ahead and make the decision on the website which will be a completely new platform.

Councilmember Snow and Council President Berglund met with the Black Mountains at the Camp Methodist Meeting Ground and are still hashing out details. Work is progressing. They have a timeline and list of what they hope to achieve, what is being donated, and what grants they are working on. They continue to move forward.

Mayor Silver reported that the Eagle Scout project of the reconstruction of the bulletin board outside the Post Office was stalled last year. However, the young man who was going to do the project has now reached out to him and has expressed his desire to continue with the project. The Mayor will keep everyone informed of the progress.

#### **10. LARRY MORGAN OF TILSON TECHNOLOGY APPEARING REGARDING RIGHT-OF-WAY REQUEST.**

Larry Morgan of Tilson Technology, a hired contractor by Verizon Wireless, appeared to answer questions by the Council regarding granting right-of-way authorization to place nodes on existing utility poles in the town in an effort to enhance signal strength in Island Heights.

Mr. Morgan said that Verizon would install 1 to 15 nodes, often times they install less than 5 nodes, in communities the size of Island Heights. These nodes are installed more for enhancing data and not for voice usage. Phones are being used more for data now, than for voice. Phones are being used for emailing, texting, Facebook, taking pictures and Pokémon Go and it all soaks up the signal that is out there. Verizon Wireless has developed small cell technology that zeroes in on specific areas where signals are weak or non-existent or in areas where they expect the signal to become weak or non-existent in the future. Landlines are shrinking and the use of cell phones are growing exponentially.

Verizon identifies the areas where the signal is weak and installs a 24 to 27 inch circular antenna on the top of the utility pole. They also install a 50 to 55 inch tall radio cabinet about 15 feet up off the ground on to the pole which operates the antenna. This enhances the signal strength and increases the capacity of the signal. It doesn't increase the coverage, which is what the cell towers do. This enhances the signal in areas where it is weak. If there are many people using their cell phones at the same time for data in that particular area the signal will become weak. It is called "signal exhaust." It prevents others from using their phones. This technology is used for that.

Attachment agreements have been reached between Verizon Wireless and all utility companies in the State of New Jersey. This allows Verizon Wireless to attach this equipment. Verizon Wireless is asking the Borough of Island Heights for permission to be in the borough's right-of-way, to access the utility poles that they are going to focus on, which are located in the borough's rights-of-way.

Mayor Silver said he would like Mr. Morgan to provide a map of where these utility poles will be. Mr. Morgan said he can't do that because he needs the authorization to be in the area to zero in on the poles that will be utilized. Mayor Silver said that this has nothing to do with installation of the product; Mr. Morgan has to do a survey and come up with locations throughout the town to find out where this enhanced cellular device would have to be installed. Mr. Morgan said that it is called "due diligence." Mr. Morgan said that it could very well be that there is no need for any of these installations in Island Heights. They may find the signal strength is fine for now and may be revisited in a year or two. If they do zero in on a pole, they must evaluate what is on the pole and if the structural integrity of the pole will pass the grade to add the equipment to it.

Verizon is being proactive and asking for permission to be in the borough's rights-of-way. They are not trying to circumvent the borough's processes. If they locate poles, they will submit on a case by case basis specific drawings and schematics for each location to the borough's approval process. If there are any red flags, they will be addressed. Verizon Wireless will pay for permits and traffic control. In a worse-case scenario, each installation will take 6 hours.

Council President Berglund asked where the power is drawn from. Mr. Morgan said that it comes from the power on the utility pole. Council President Berglund said he asked the Building Official about the permits needed for the nodes. The Building Official told him that unless they are putting in meters and are actually tying-in to electrical service, he probably would not be involved. Mr. Morgan said they would have to attach a separate meter to the pole. Mayor Silver said they would have to obtain the electrical permits through Beachwood. Council President Berglund said that if they are installing meters, they must go through the building and electrical departments for permits. Mr. Morgan agreed.

Mayor Silver said that Verizon Wireless needs the Council's approval to come in and survey the borough and see if nodes are required. Mr. Morgan said that there are areas that just don't get signals. He used the Boston Marathon bombing as an example. No one could use their phones because everyone was using their phones. This helps prevent that from happening. It insures a constant, steady, strong, signal at all times.

Unidentified members of the audience asked what the nodes would look like. Mayor Silver told them it resembled a transformer but it would be placed at the top of the pole. Council President Berglund said to think of it as the shape of a transformer but only the size of the pole in diameter.

Councilmember Bendel moved the original resolution granting Verizon Wireless right-of-way access to the borough's utility poles. Council President Berglund seconded the motion. All present members of the governing body voted unanimously in favor of the motion.

Mayor Silver told Mr. Morgan that his workers should wear ID and reflective vests while doing work in the town. Mr. Morgan said they would.

Mr. Morgan asked the Acting Clerk to email him the authorizing resolution. She said she would.

**11. PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR**

Bill Hummel, 18 Ocean Bend, asked if anyone talked to the Council about converting one of the tennis courts to a pickleball court. Mayor Silver said it was approved but there was an issue with the striping. Councilmember Snow said the issue was that the measurements of the court for pickleball were smaller than the tennis court. There is also a crack in the court that is a problem. Mayor Silver said that he wanted to get the crack filled. He said that Jill Burt came up with a schematic for the layout of the lines and it got put on hold because of the crack in the court. Mr. Hummel asked if the borough could move forward with the plans. Mayor Silver said that he could make arrangements to have the crack filled in and work on the layout for one side of the court. The Mayor said he would try to get it done for spring time.

Betsy Hyle, 266 Summit Avenue, asked about bringing back the trash cans at the pet waste stations. People are not picking up after their dogs and leaving a mess. Mayor Silver said that the borough received money from a recycling tonnage grant and he will use that to buy trash containers. Hopefully they will be here before spring.

Lisa DeFeo, 176 Lake Avenue, asked if there was any further information about the pay stations along the boardwalk. Mayor Silver said that data is being collected and a study is being done on the amount of cars parking there during the week and on weekends. Right now it is just discussion and collecting data to see what kind of revenue it could possible generate.
